PRESIDENT'S REPORT AUGUST 2012

The consistently high numbers of people attending our monthly public meetings bears testament to the commitment of members and the interest of our community in ensuring we collect information from the past, learn from it in the present and preserve it for the future.

Membership and attendances:

Our membership and email contacts have continued to grow during the year. Attendance at meetings has ranged from 60 to 120 people.

Advertising, Marketing and promotional support:

Business cards for the Society were printed to assist with communicating contact details.

We are grateful for the support of the following people in promoting the Society:

- Village News for generous promotion through articles of historical interest which included publicising our events each month. Gerard Benjamin has been very faithful in preparing articles for the Village News
- The Independent newspaper for assistance with promotion of meetings by publishing the advertising poster each month
- Gerard Benjamin has been sought out by 4BC for several interviews about history and he takes the opportunity to use it as promotion of the activities of the Society
- Mr Robert Cavallucci, MP, whose staff at the Brisbane Electorate Office has printed the monthly newsletter at no cost to the Society

Other projects:

- Ross Garnett was actively involved on the Board of the Teneriffe Festival for the third festival in July this year. This Society and several other organisations with interest in things historical were involved in the event, which was a huge success. The Magical Mystery Heritage Bus Tour of Teneriffe based on the Tides of Teneriffe proved very popular again this year. Thanks to Santina Musumeci for coordinating the bus tour on behalf of NFDHS with the Omnibus and Coach Society and to Phil Evans, Sandra Griffiths and Melissa Griffiths for acting as tour guides.
- **Book Sales** of *Reflections on New Farm* and *Tides of Teneriffe* continue through local bookshops and at the monthly meetings.
- The **Historical Plaques** Project has continued. Funding was received from the Lord Mayor's Suburban Initiative Fund for this continuing project and we are grateful to Councillor David Hinchliffe for his support of the Society in this and many other ways. Gerard Benjamin was engaged to research and design the plaques that now stand in prominent places for passing residents and visitors to read about the local history. In the past 12 months, the following plaques have been erected:
 - London Woolstores: This was a joint project of the NFDHS and the Body Corporate of London Woolstore which celebrates the centenary of the building this year. The Lord Mayor, Graham Quirk, unveiled this historical plaque at the Teneriffe Festival.
 - o The Tram Shed in Merthyr Rd, New Farm
 - Arbour walk at the end of Gray St, New Farm.
- The NFDHS **website** was redeveloped using a grant from the Lord Mayor's Suburban Initiative Fund.
- Funding was received from the Lord Mayor's Suburban Initiative Fund to produce a **book on historic residences** in New Farm and Teneriffe. Gerard Benjamin has been engaged to write this book which should be published in 2013.
- Many members of the public contact the society for information for their **personal research** into family connections or about particular houses. There is a need for more volunteers to assist in this way.

Christmas Donation: As is our custom, members gave donations at our November 2011 meeting and these were given to New Farm Neighbourhood Centre to support their work with the disadvanted in our community.

Monthly meetings: Meetings have attracted from 60 to 120 people and have covered an interesting variety of topics as follows:
