APRIL MEETING

Lennons, a focus during WWII

G UEST speaker and novelist, Melanie Myer (pictured), transported more than 80 of us back to 1941 when Brisbane hosted a goodwill visit by USS

Chicago. A tickertape parade from Queen St to the Valley welcomed the 6,000 US Marines.

The goodwill tour of 1941 introduced young 'college educated' US Marines, whose Americanstyle courtesy, gifts, cigarettes, and generous tipping, endeared them to



families and hotel staff, and particularly impressed the young girls of Brisbane whose universal reaction was, "We had the best time of our lives".

After the fall of Singapore in 1942, General MacArthur relocated to Brisbane, and the recently opened, glamorous Art Deco Lennons Hotel in George St remained a focal point until 1945. The impact on Brisbane (population 300,000) of the 'American invasion' provided a dramatic backdrop for Melanie's fictional account, *Meet Me at Lennons*.

By 1942, around tens of thousands US troops were based in Brisbane. 12,000 Australian women married US servicemen, and 7,000 were Brisbane girls. Church-run hostels for single women included Archibald House and GFS House, both in Moray St, New Farm. The mobilisation of women, working in factories and

other roles, was lifechanging for them. Recreational



spots for the troops included The US Navy Officers Mess in Oxlade Dr, and hotels and brothels in South Brisbane, Margaret and Mary Sts and the inner city. There were also the Trocadero in South Brisbane, the US Military Post Exchange (PX), the American Red Cross (Primary's Building, Adelaide and Creek Sts), and the Doctor Carver Service Club (opp Melbourne St train station) which catered to African-American soldiers and introduced 'jazz and cool music'.

The return of thousands of Australian troops of the 7th and 9th Divs redeployed from the Middle East heading for the New Guinea campaign, created tensions which erupted in the infamous 'Battle of Brisbane' near Adelaide and Creek Sts in late 1942.

MELANIE'S INTEREST as a PhD student in this period of Brisbane's history (including New Farm's role) inspired her debut novel *Meet Me at Lennons* which won the 2018 Glendower Award for an Emerging Author at the Qld Literary Awards. No wonder attendees were keen to obtain a copy! Many thanks, Melanie. This era was perfect for many of our audience.

DEVELOPMENT

Monaise, once part of Hawstead

The block of six flats at 299 Bowen Tce (pictured) was built ca 1923, making it one of the earliest flat developments in New Farm.

The property had been a small part of the large Hawstead estate, which had been purchased in 1912 by Josephine, widow of District Court Judge George Washington Power. The original Hawstead homestead is reputed to have had many marble baths.



Mrs Power further divided the property. This unit block, known as "Monaise", was on the site of Hawstead's croquet lawn, while on the adjoining portion, once Hawstead's tennis court, Hampton Court flats were built ca 1927, the architects being Hall and Prentice.

The late John O'Keeffe (grandson of Mrs Power) knew Monaise as a boy and recalled that the Brisbane manager of Dalgety's, an Englishman, lived in the top floor flat where he could see Moreton Island.

Monaise was retained by the family until 1972 when Hawstead was also demolished.

The Monaise site has been the subject of a recent Development Application (A005900020) for the erection of a seven-storey building.

MESSAGE TO THE EDITOR

Visiting Shafston's Anzac Hostel

C hrista Gerard's article featuring Shafston House in last month's newsletter prompted this reminiscence from Jim MacDonald.

Shafston House served as a hospice for diggers who had been injured whilst serving at the front in WWI and had been left seriously injured. Since 1920, it had been known as the Anzac Hostel. My father James Donald MacDonald had himself survived injuries in that conflict and understood the plight of these men.

Through the 1920-30s, he provided some support by way of regularly visiting to simply talk and offer companionship with these often lonely and forgotten souls. He often took along my elder brother as added company for these patients.

The injured included men who had been burned by exposure to mustard gas. The men's skin never healed and remained a continuing painful legacy. To achieve relief from these burning sensations, the man was often required to lay in baths of oil for extended periods.

In July 1935, the Hostel was visited by Billy Hughes, the Minister for Health and Repatriation (and former Prime Minister). At the time, there were nine patients in residence.

REPLY FROM THE WEBSITE

Happy wool days...

Y name is John Hunt and at the age of 15, I started my working career for Australian Estates from August 1968 until 1974.

I began as a junior and my first day was to sweep E floor which was in the new building (No 2 store). It was BIG and took me most of my first day.

When I became a senior at the age of 18, they made me the Head Weigher. The wool was unloaded in the rail siding with a conveyor system which was fantastic for that era. It travelled the full length of the siding then went up to B floor (second floor of the old building) where I was seated at the scales with all the controls for all



conveyors from the B floor scales all the way along B floor across the catwalk and continued across E floor with drops and elevators all along, so as to service every floor in both buildings.

I remember that on a lot of days we weighed wool the whole time and still did not finish it all. These were the most enjoyable days of my working career. My manager at the time was RW. He was my first manager, and to be honest the best I ever had.

After leaving Australian Estates in 1974 when I also did three years' night college for Wool Classing, I moved on to the testing side of wool in Beeston St, Newstead, with the Australian Wool Testing Authority (AWTA). I continued with them until 2005, leaving the wool industry behind.

Snapshot of Brunswick St Queenslander arrives from WA

Trish, a long-time local resident, received an email from her Western Australian friends, Marie and Dennis, along with the photo of an old Queenslander.

"Do what you will with the attached," wrote Dennis. "It's the house in which my mother grew up. The photo was taken by her in 1938. Sadly the house is long gone." The address on the photo was 562 Brunswick St, nowadays the carpark of IGA Marketplace.

Trish showed the email to your columnist and hardly needed to ask, "Does this interest you?" A timeline of the house was soon assembled, courtesy of digitised newspapers at Trove.

It emerged that the house, named Levroma ("stylish, seven rooms, bath, 34 perches"), was occupied from at least 1904 by four adult children of Mr and Mrs W.T. Keenan.

These children might have spent part of their childhood at the Explosives Magazine, Eagle Farm, where their father had been the resident keeper. At his death in October 1892 (his wife had died earlier), the Post Office flag was at half-mast out of respect for his 27 years with the public service. Levroma eventually devolved to the younger son, Joshua, who became prominent at the Auditor-General's Department. In 1916, he married Ethel, a daughter of Richard Bryant, head of the long-established firm of mercers in Roma, Queensland. (Remarkable that the house name already had 'roma' in it...)

When Joshua and Ethel's three children arrived in the early 1920s, Mrs Keenan only had to pop next door to The Laurels Private Hospital. These births were well-timed because in October 1928, the hospital went up in flames. Mr. Keenan rushed home while the fire was in progress. He found that his stalwart neighbours had removed furniture and goods in case the house should catch alight. Luckily only the paint was blistered.

Margaret, the eldest, liked submitting stories to the newspapers,

such as "A Walk in the Bush" (when aged 11). By the time she was 16 and attending the State Commercial High School, she won 2/6 for "On A Cattle Station".

When your columnist forwarded these details and more to Dennis in WA (Margaret's son), he replied, "My mother was a prolific reader and writer all of her adult life and instilled

the importance of these skills in all her children."

Margaret recorded recollections about growing up in New Farm. "She describes extensive vegetable gardens in the backyard. Also two large mango trees and a persimmon tree. She mentions walking as young children to New Farm Park and listening to the band play on the rostrum," wrote Dennis.

"She recalled being evacuated to the street when firemen were called to the fire at The Laurels hospital next door. She remembered watching, from their landing above the back steps, skaters at the public skating rink next door – and that during the war, the skating rink became a picture theatre (Earl's Court, later The Rivoli).

"The family never owned a car but once a year they would hire one so as to holiday at Margate or Maroochydore," wrote Dennis.

Margaret's mother Ethel Keenan died in 1936, leaving Joshua and the three young children. Come 1946, Dennis's mother left Levroma when she married and moved to WA. In 1949, her father Joshua died. After that the house was sold by Margaret's two younger siblings.

Thanks to Dennis Forte for his mother's snapshot and recollections, and thanks also to Trish for conveying the message. One never knows just how far the New Farm diaspora stretches...


