How fortunate are the members and friends of our Society! The quality of our guest speakers is second to none. And Bob Tucker was no exception, widening our knowledge of what lies in our own

back yard – albeit across the river [from me] at Eagle Farm.

Bob is directly involved with TradeCoast Central Heritage Park. He could have spoken on

- The Interpretive Centre
- Convict Women's Prison and Factory
- Hangar No 7 Wartime Secrets
- Allison Engine Testing Stands (aeroplane buffs will marvel at the information to be found at the Heritage Park.)

Bob barely touched on the role women played in early Brisbane! As always, men cannot do without them. Even though the women were convicts, disrupting and desirable, they had to be removed to Eagle Farm.

No. The focus of Bob's talk was the aspect of military life here in the early '40s and how close were the ties of our Forces with their American counterparts.

BUT – a picture is worth a thousand words and to achieve an overall impression of how closely the US worked with Australia at that time, I urge you to watch the video of Bob's presentation.

Built in the 1880s, Nvrambla. Henry Street. Ascot, was the Headquarters of Central Bureau. The explanation of the Japanese code breaking that assisted in the Pacific Campaign was an interesting aspect of the talk. Another story was how five crashed Zeros found in New Guinea and the Solomons were re-assembled into one Zero here at Eagle Farm. Bob

was able to get in touch with the son of the Test Pilot and an emotional meeting, here in Brisbane, ensued.














APRIL MEETING PRESENTATION



2024 marks the Bicentennial of Moreton Bay, a notorious penal station established on the northern fringes of the vast territory the British had claimed as New South Wales. By extension it is also the foundational moment for Brisbane Town, the future capital of Queensland. My presentation explores how the people of Brisbane marked the centenary milestone in 1924. The Melbourne press was predictably quick to remind Brisbane of its "Unpropitious" penal beginnings, but the city's centenary organising committee were determined and resourceful in their efforts to rise to their historical occasion. It will likely come as no surprise that convicts did not feature on the program or that the participation of indigenous Australians was coerced and controlled. The opening event was staged at our very own Newstead Park, the putative site of Oxley's landing in 1823. As a social historian I am chiefly interested in how the tone and emphasis of the various celebrations reflected wider cultural and political life in the 1920s. And as the curator and co-convener of a special Bicentennial Conference, to be held at Griffith University later this year, I cannot help but observe how the themes and trajectories that preoccupy us in 2024 would have been inconceivable to the men and women of 1924. The past really is another country.

So far this year we have been pleased to welcome twenty-four new members to our society – including twelve at the February and two at the March meeting, with the remainder joining by other means including by visiting our office.





The books came from the library of **Peter Banney** who lives in Kingston, Tasmania, and who, in his beautifully handwritten note, said "I am pleased to be able to donate these

volumes to an institution that will value them. 'Welsby' is a famous name is New Farm."

Thomas Welsby was, among many other business responsibilities too numerous to mention here, the Chairman of the New Farm State School Committee to establish the school which opened in 1901. He was also member of the Legislative Assembly in Qld representing Merthyr. He was the resident of the beautiful home *Amity* in New Farm – right at the river end of Welsby Street. Welsby



was a lover of history, so these volumes written by him are invaluable. They are available for reading on Thursday afternoons at the society office

Z SPECIAL UNIT – AND JAPANESE MORSE CODE

Bob Tucker's talk about the Central Bureau naturally raised the question of "Z Special Unit", a commando force established in 1942. The uncle of audience member **Marion Dunstan**, John Hope Clatworthy (1916-52), was in the unit. "While on Fraser Island, he trained people going to Asia in radio and Japanese Morse code, and he was also active in New Guinea," she said.

Marion has a letter dated 16/5/1941 [note: seven months before Pearl Harbour] which reads,

"My dear Clatworthy,....I am enclosing a code which I would like you both to learn yourselves. Keep it to yourself what you are doing. Try to get as much practice on the key to get the symbolic swing of the code into your ears, then later on you can get experience by listening in to their stations. cannot tell you much except that I have started a class of my qualified operators here for a special work, which I hope will not have to be undertaken."

Reformatory, 16/5/1941.

My Dear Clatworthy,

I have often listened to your stations working at night and it has given me quite athrill.

I am enclosing a code, which I would like you both to learn yourselves -keep it to yourself what you are doing - try and get as much practice on the key to get the symbolic swing of the code into your ears - then later on you can get experience by listening in to their stations.

Incidentally, Marion's connection with New Farm goes back to early days. She is a g-g-granddaughter of merchant and politician, George Raff, whose residence *Moraybank* once stood (possibly from the 1850s) near today's Moray Café (cnr with Merthyr Rd).

Z Special also features in the family tree of society member Gerard Benjamin. A first cousin of his mother's, James Joseph O'Dwyer (a former teacher from Muttaburra), lost his life on the Platypus VII mission to Borneo in 1945. Years later, his son Michael O'Dwyer did his best to find out what happened. As his sister (Maggie Stahnke) explained: "He was lucky to find an elderly gentleman in Japan (in his 80s) who had been at the exact jungle depot where our commandos had been dropped on 30 June 1945. This gentleman was even there when our Dad was killed and was able to draw a map and tell the interpreter what happened." As a result, Michael O'Dwyer was finally able to identify their Dad's remains. Previously marked 'Unknown' they are in Grave 5D5 at the Labuan War Cemetery in Malaysia.

REMEMBERING THE SS GOUCHER VICTORY

In late December 1947, passers-by on Newstead Terrace paused to witness a guard of honour and a melancholy procession at the Maud Street entrance to Newstead Wharf. This was to mark the departure of 1,864 US war

dead for reburial in national war cemeteries aboard the Victory ship USAT Goucher Victory.

Among those who have campaigned for over a year for this milestone to be remembered is Society member, **John Gates**. Happily, John can report that in late 2023, a plaque was installed in a garden setting on the Newstead Riverwalk adjacent to Maud Street. Why not pause to inspect the plaque on your next riverside amble.




